That notwithstanding, this is a true account of the personal experiences of the author and some of his family members over the course of 54 years of his existence on God's green earth.

"OMEOVOUSU: Battles of a Mother and Her Firstborn" is made up of 7 sections and 26 chapters. The first section consists of chapter 1 to chapter 3. Chapter 1 is a narration of how Mr. Smart Oteje found the young beautiful daughter of Mr. James Ughedegba by name Dawn and expressed his interest to have her as his wife. But, Mr. Ughedegba was hostile toward Smart and chased him away repeatedly with a cutlass. However, Mr. Smart Oteje was relentless in the pursuit of his dream. 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Chapter 2

Early Days of Growing Up

I was a very brilliant child while growing up. Blessed with a very high Intelligent Quotient (IQ), I was already communicating very well in English and Yoruba languages at the young age of 4.

As Christians, it was a mandatory part of my parents' faith to go on regular evangelism every week. So, I would accompany them and also participate actively in preaching to people. Everyone I preached to, many of whom were old enough to be my father or mother, were beyond themselves with marvel at the way I preached to them at such a young age. As we left them, I would overhear them calling out their children of about the same age as I was and telling them:

"Come and see your age mate preaching the bible. All you know is to play up and down all day!"

And when I began my secular education, I was so brilliant that I would come out first or second in my class and never beyond third. This continued on into my secondary school days and higher education.

I must have taken after my mother because she was very intelligent during her childhood and even as an adult. She completed her secondary education up to modern 3 with good grade back then. However, she could not continue with her studies because she had no one to facilitate her admission into Teachers Training College. One of my paternal uncles who could have helped her at that time said it was against his religion to give or collect bribe.

He also said the same thing when I had the opportunity of attending the secondary school at my paternal hometown. The school was my preferred choice and I passed the common entrance. But after attending the interview, the result came out and I was failed. And my uncle who could have helped said he

neither gave nor collected a bribe. So, I lost the opportunity to attend that school.

I learned later in life that NO ONE OWES YOU ANYTHING. If they chose to help, fine. But, if they chose not to help, great. And if they chose neither to help nor even direct you to someone who can help, excellent. But that will not prevent you from reaching where God has designed for you. And, as you will find out in this book, we definitely got to where God designed for us!

Despite not being able to attend the Teachers Training College, the fact that my mother was very intelligent was not in doubt at all. To buttress just how intelligent she truly was, she later ventured into business and excelled beyond measure. And she always did all her calculations with her brain without using a calculator in her business.

But that is not to say that my father was not intelligent. He had his primary school education. However, he could not continue with his education because of financial constraints. However, they were able to see me through my primary school education. And I also got admitted into another secondary school in the old Bendel State, Nigeria.

But, my father and I gradually drifted apart as the years went by, though I cannot say for sure why or how things fell apart. Looking back now, I believe the disaffection must have begun when he started travelling from one place to another trying to earn an income to provide for his young family. Since he was not always home during the formative years, I became more attached to my mom than to him.

It was at this period when both my parents were not around and I had to stay with a neighbor for a night or two that I was sexually abused by the man. That was just before we left Ondo State for Benin City. I did not tell anyone about that incident till this day. And that perhaps accounted for why I began experimenting with sex at a very early age of 11.

As we drifted apart, I could no longer communicate with my father face-to-face. I remember on one occasion during my secondary education when I needed something for my school.

I could not meet and tell him my needs. Unbelievable, right? But, that's the truth! Yet, I had to tell him somehow. I could have told my mom so that she could be my mouthpiece. But I did not. So, what did I do? The only thought which entered my mind was to write him a letter! So, I sat down and I wrote on a piece of paper:

"We were asked to bring so and so (can't remember exactly what it was) in school."

Then I placed the paper on top of the table where I knew he would see it. Just imagine that. Writing a letter to my own father while living with him in the same house! However, he did nothing to correct this anomaly. He merely mocked me that I was an English prof writing him a letter while living with him in the same house!

Some fathers would have sat the child down and had a heart-to-heart talk with him to redress this problem. But not my father. He simply allowed the silent rift to escalate unhindered.

It became so bad that my father even accused me of falsifying my school results in a vain attempt to deceive him that I did well in the exams. But he could have verified the result if he had wanted to. All he needed to have done was visit the school to find out if the result I presented to him was fake or not. But he did not.

Just imagine that! A father thinking his son could be so mischievous to the point of falsifying his school result at the young age of 13 or 14! But that was what he chose to believe. Though painful as it was, I did not exchange a word with him to counter the accusation. But, despite the rift which was gradually escalating, my father always paid my school fees and provided for my welfare.

I freely admit that I was not a saint and was stubborn as a child. I remember an incident when an accomplice friend and I almost devoured in half the bush meat that my mother bought for her restaurant business back in 1977/78. My father was not around. But my mother, an action woman back then, was so furious that she got a new razor blade and designed two sharp marks each on my two hands.

But is there any child, especially a male, on this planet who was not stubborn and mischievous while growing up? I assure you that such children are not up to 1% of their entire population!

Eventually, I finished secondary school at the age of 16, while my junior brother was just entering class two and three of my other siblings were in different classes in primary school.

Lessons from this chapter:

- 1) Do not rely on humans for help. They will always fail you when you least expect it. And, by the way, always remember that no one owes you anything.
- 2) It is important to be a part of your child's life at the formative years of their growing up so that strangers and neighbors would not take advantage of them.
- 3) Be firm and discipline a child when necessary but do not overdo it to the point of alienating the child from you.

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
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
